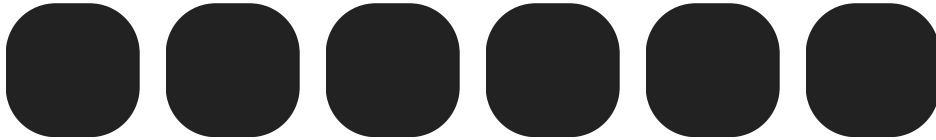

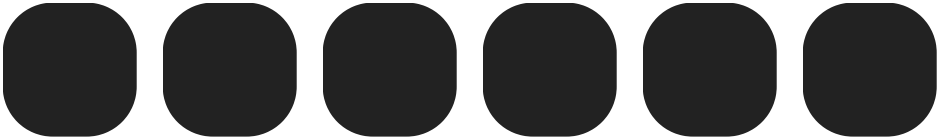
Steve was a wonderful husband, father and grandfather. He will be sadly missed by his family and many friends.
