The 2022 Malden Junior Varsity Volleyball Tournament will be held on Saturday, August 27.

There are twelve teams participating. They are listed in no particular order: Malden, Twin Rivers, Dexter, Gideon, Clarkton, Caruthersville, Kennett, Senath, Portageville, Campbell, Delta C-7 and New Madrid County Central.

Pool A includes Kennett, Twin Rivers, Malden and Delta C-7.

Pool B includes Gideon, Caruthersville, Campbell, and Senath.

Pool C includes Dexter, Clarkton, Portageville, and New Madrid County Central.

Games will begin promptly at 8:00 a.m. Malden will utilize both the high school and elementary gyms. Pool A and B will play all of their games in the High school gym, while pool C will play in the elementary gym. ONLY THE TOP TEAMS FROM EACH POOL WILL ADVANCE TO GOLD BRACKET. Gold, silver, and bronze brackets are determined by W/L, then point differentials.

The tournament will begin promptly after pool play results are posted.

All tournament games will be played on these courts as follows; gold bracket court 1, silver bracket court 2, bronze bracket court 3.

There will be gift baskets and items for auction

Concession stands in elementary and high school lobbies, cash only.

Plaques will be given for first and second place in each bracket, Gold, Silver, and Bronze.

There are no Covid restrictions in place for this tournament.

Pool Play Format- two 25 point games with a 27 point cap, games begin with a score of 4-4.

Tournament-Single elimination, two out of three sets, the first two sets are to 25,(no point cap), If a deciding third set is needed, it will be played to 15 (no point cap) (win by 2).

The teams from each pool will be placed on a predetermined bracket based on the results of pool play.

If a tie occurs in pool play, the following steps will be taken to determine bracket play seeding: Wins/Losses, then head to head, then head to head points, total points, if there is still a tie the teams will play one set to 15.(no cap)

MDC Managed Waterfowl Reservations for Fall Open September 1st

MDC Managed Waterfowl Reservations for Fall Open September 1st

MDC managed waterfowl reservations for fall open Sept. 1

Pre-season reservation period will run Sept. 1-18. In-season weekly drawings will take place Monday afternoons.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) announces its managed waterfowl hunts for this hunting season. The pre-season reservation period will run Sept. 1-18 with results posted Oct. 1. The in-season weekly drawings will take place on Monday afternoons with a seven-day application period that opens the Tuesday before and closes the Monday of the draw at 3 p.m.

Missouri residents and qualifying non-residents, such as students from out of state or members of the military stationed in Missouri, can apply online for a reservation to guarantee them an opportunity to hunt on a specific day on a specific area. Residents and nonresidents can also arrive at a managed waterfowl hunting area the morning they wish to hunt and wait in line for the possibility of getting a hunting spot.

Applicants for waterfowl reservations must have their required permits to apply, and their Federal Duck Stamp to hunt.

MDC offers managed waterfowl hunting on more than a dozen conservation areas specially managed with a focus on wetlands. Hunters can apply for a reservation or participate in a daily morning drawing for opportunities to hunt at these areas. MDC also offers waterfowl hunting on other conservation areas. In addition to MDC areas, Missouri offers waterfowl hunting opportunities at numerous other public and private locations around the state.

For this fall, MDC's waterfowl reservation system will offer 50 percent of daily hunting positions for the managed-hunt areas through online reservations. Of the 50 percent of

spots through online reservations, half will be for pre-season applications and half will be allocated during a weekly in-season application period. The remaining 50 percent of spots will be held for hunters who participate in the daily morning drawing and wait in the "poor line" for the possibility of getting a hunting spot.

"Under this reservation system, if an area offers 20 daily hunting positions, five will be allocated through pre-season reservations and five through in-season reservations," explained Joel Porath, who coordinates managed waterfowl hunts for MDC. "The remaining 10 positions will be allocated to hunters from the poor line the morning of each hunt."

Successful pre-season and in-season reservation applicants will be notified after their respective draws via email or text message with their hunt date, location, and pill assignment. "Pills" designate the order hunting parties select their hunting locations on the area. The lower the number, the sooner hunting parties get to select their hunting location.

"This will let reservation holders know before they leave their homes if their randomly generated number will enable them to be one of the first, middle, or last parties to pick their hunting location," said Porath.

Only one member from each hunting party will be allowed to have a staff member pull a pill for their respective party. Residents and nonresidents can hunt with a reservation holder and hunting parties are limited to a maximum of four people.

MDC also notes that hunters with disabilities will apply to use ADA hunting blinds through the online reservation system during the same timeframe as the preseason application period. ADA blinds that are not selected and allocated during the preseason drawing will be placed in the weekly in-season draws.

The athletes and coaches have worked and sacrificed all summer long to get to this point. With new head coach Chad Jamerson at the helm, the Bearcats are starting to come together as a team.

"I believe we learned today that things are never as bad as we think...nor are they ever as good as we think. Just like in life, things aren't always going to go our way. So, how do we handle adversity. That's a lesson that we always have to continue teaching to our youth. "Are you going to lay down or are you going to stand and fight?" I believe that if you continue working hard, good things can happen."

Dexter's schedule is a tough one this year. They are on the road at New Madrid County Central, Caruthersville and Malden. At home they will see East Prairie, Doniphan, Kennett and Park Hills Central. All incredibly good team and will be challenging to beat.

"We, as a program, must continue to have perspective in terms of our expectations vs our outcomes. Along with that, we are learning to trust each other and the playbook. Sometimes, we only see the pieces instead of the entire puzzle. Today, I believe we started to put the pieces in the right place to make the big picture less murky. Ultimately, it's a TEAM game. The players and coaches have to learn to "do your job" while also trusting that your teammates and coaches will do just that, their job," continued Jameson.

This year's homecoming will be September 16th against East Prairie, which just happens to be Coach Jamerson's home town.

"This is always an exciting time of year. So much promise and possibility. The time to see where we are is coming quickly," state Jamerson.

"Thank you to all those that have supported our kids. We appreciate that. Personally, I want to say thank you to our kids and our coaches. They really do keep the machine running. With continued hard work, some luck, and faith...I believe we are headed in the right direction."

The Bearcats host a Football Jamboree on Friday, August 19th against Fredericktown, Poplar Bluff, and Caruthersville. They open on the road at Scott City the following Friday.
